CRICKET - THE REGIONAL FINAL

On Thursday 12th June our Kwik Cricket squad of 9 (Zack, Deyann, Charlie T, Harry S, Jay S, Owen W, Ben S, Adam B and Theo L) went to Bristol Grammar School to compete in the Kwik Cricket Regional Finals.

When we arrived we were assigned to a pitch where we would play our games. First we played the school from Buckinghamshire. We batted first and posted a score of 255 only losing 1 wicket. They came out to bat. In the first over Zack took a triple wicket maiden (he took 3 wickets and no runs were scored). We ended up taking 10 wickets reducing them to 187.

In the next game we played against the school from the Isle of Wight (New Church). Again we won the toss and chose to bat first. We cruised our way to an even higher score of 264 again losing 1 wicket. In reply New Church struggled to put up a fight losing wickets at crucial times. Despite their fight, they finished on 229 losing 3 wickets. We topped our group with 2 wins.

In the third game we played against Cornwall champions to try and secure first place. Losing the toss we were put to bowl first. A strong battling display meant that we had to fight for victory as they scored 262 with no wickets lost. We fought strong but had to face defeat scoring 253 with one wicket lost.

For the final game we played the school from Hampshire. For a chance to win the tournament we needed to win against Knightwood. Winning the toss, we batted first and posted 261 losing 2 wickets. They needed some power hitting to win against us. They were going strong but lost quite a few wickets. In the end they put together a score of 249 losing 4 crucial wickets.

Unfortunately, St Hilary (Cornwall) had beaten Knightwood. For us this was disappointing as it meant St Hilary would win the tournament. Heartbroken we had to watch St Hilary lift the trophy. We knew we had done extremely well and had to take all of the positives out of our journey.

We talk about how Year 8 should be role models for the rest of the school and nothing could be more apt when describing the 74 pupils who are about to move on to their chosen upper schools.

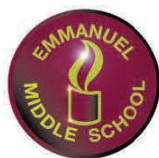
