# IMPORTANT INFORMATION Administration of Medicines

If you wish school staff to administer medication to your child, parents <u>must</u> complete the consent form which can be obtained from the school office or <u>on the school website</u> (Information/School Forms). Staff will be unable to administer <u>any</u> medication (this includes Strepsils and similar throat lozenges) without the required form - <u>a note in the diary or a letter</u> will not be acceptable.

Staff are unable to administer aspirin or medicines containing ibuprofen unless they are prescribed by a doctor.

All medicines must be in their original box or container.

All prescribed medicines must be provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include the instructions for administration.



# I'm a Scientist Get Me Out of Here

Year 6 pupils who were selected to take part in the I'm a Scientist Get Me Out of Here after school club have been enjoying themselves getting stuck into some new topics. They have been reviewing rocket seed growth, identifying the parts of a cell by creating Elodea and Onion cell slides to be viewed under the microscope and making their own plant cells. They have also been identifying the key elements necessary for photosynthesis (plants making their own food) and conducting an experiment to see which form of light was best for photosynthesis.

The people on relay the first day were freezing, as they were in a gazebo with no sides, and it was really windy. When you are on relay, you have to be there all day, as all the messages have to go through relay first. When I was on Control, I played different card games with people, as not much happens in Control.

On the second day, I was on relay the whole day and, though it wasn't as cold as the day before, it was still freezing! We had to huddle up in blankets until about 1 o clock as the pub down the road didn't open until 12. When they opened, they brought us down tea and coffee which was really nice. After that we gradually warmed up, and we got to see all the marchers from different regiments go past. There were a few regiments from different countries as well, and we saw Germans, Spanish, Belgians and a few more. When they went past, we asked them if they had any spare badges to collect, and we got loads! On Sunday we went home, and we didn't get back until 10pm!

## YEAR 7 AND 8 NEWS

#### **Prospective Year 8 Ambassadors**

Now that the Summer Term is well underway, we have begun the process of selecting the 2019-2020, Year 8 Ambassadors. The current Year 7 pupils need to be aware that these coveted positions are linked to some agreed criteria. Firstly, an Ambassador has to have an attendance data score which stands at -at least 96% in July. In addition, the average attitude to learning score of a potential Ambassador will need to be at, or above 3.6. Prospective Ambassadors have by-now submitted an application form - detailing their personal qualities and understanding of what they think the role entails. EMS staff are also given an opportunity to endorse / vet the list of applicants.

Once appointed, our Ambassadors carryout a number of responsible roles (including providing prospective pupils and adults with tours of the school). This year I'm intending to limit the number of new ambassadors - capping their numbers at no more than 20 pupils. In doing so, I would hope to add greater value to the title and also ensure that only children who are genuinely willing to fulfil their roles become Ambassadors.

There are numerous other, super opportunities such as 'Sports Leader', or 'Arts Ambassador' that the pupils may also wish to pursue as part of their transition year.

Again, it's great that the whole year group is 'on board'! All the children have had the opportunity to pair up with at least one friend of choice and as a team we've done our best to provide the children with a balanced and ultimately enjoyable sequence of days out. This year we've added Rock Reef 'clip and climb' to our itinerary and I'd like to commend Mrs Childs for negotiating the transport and entrance fees down to a very cost effective price.

Please take time to read and digest any ParentMail relating to the forthcoming activity week. A final letter giving full details, together with an online consent and further information form will be sent out via ParentMail after half-term. If you could complete and submit this as soon as possible please. I'll brief the pupils on what they will need to take, along with our behavioural expectations.

#### School Uniform

Unfortunately, at this time of year, some members of Years 7 and 8 tend to try to push the boundaries of what is and isn't acceptable school uniform. Please can I remind you of the necessity of making sure that your son, or daughter comes to school wearing the agreed uniform. Boys should be wearing proper black shoes (not trainers), grey or black school trousers - grey, black or white socks and ideally have haircuts that don't veer below a grade two at the sides. The girls are not allowed to wear make-up (other than a minimal amount of foundation). Nail varnish is forbidden and jewellery is limited to a single pair of stud ear rings. Skirts should be 'just above the knee' and no bracelets (other than a single, charity band) should be worn. Please reference the children's diaries for clarification.

Please remember to write a note in your child's diary for their tutor, if there is a reason why they aren't wearing the correct uniform. We are smart, nicely attired year groups and it is worth remembering that our Year 8 students act as role models to the rest of the school who often mimic their 'fashion foibles'!
