Year 8 Ambassador Selection



Y7 Maths

In Year 7 Maths we are moving on from looking at linear and non-linear sequences to start the work on algebraic notation. This work has started with function machines and understanding the vocab of 'input', 'function' and 'output' and the conventions of writing the 4 operations in algebra.

Y5 Humanities
