Safety

There is a real possibility of a serious injury where a vehicle is involved in any form of accident. We regularly talk to the children about road safety and awareness of other road / pavement users. However, children are not always as attuned to this as adult road users. Please refrain from stopping on the roundabout and dropped pavement section at the start of Margards Lane. Parking in these areas can block the view of child movement from the campus. Thank you for doing your part to keep children safe.

Reports

We send our reports out in advance of parent evening bookings to enable you to make an informed decision about which teachers to make appointments with and to ensure regular communication about your child's attitude to learning in all their subjects. Reports will come home next Friday 17th November and following an alignment with the other trust middle schools we have reversed our scoring system. This means that 1 now represents 'Exceptional' and 4 'requiring immediate improvement'.

1 Exceptional A2L	 A pupil who will exceed their academic target because they: Demonstrate a high motivation to learn. Surpasses their academic target. Produces exceptional work for their ability. Actively seeks advice to improve their work. Supports others' learning in the class. Takes on extra responsibility.
3 / 4 A2L must improve (a score of 3 indicates some of these points - a score of 4 is most of these)	 A pupil who is not meeting our expectations or their academic potential: Does not have a pen, pencil or kit. Produces work of a poor standard matched to their ability. Does not present their work to full capabilities. Regularly 'off-task', challenges, calls out and disrupts the learning environment. Does not complete H/W or hand in on time.

In Year 8 science the children have been investigating the effect of changing mass on a spring - developing their skills in carrying out an investigation and recording results.




Y5 Art
